## NYS GIS Association Education Committee 2010 Work Plan 18 January 2010

## Abstract

The Education Committee will be shifting its focus for 2010 in an effort to meet the needs of NYS GIS users faced with increasingly constrained budgets. Training is a consistent request made by the NYSGISA membership. The Education Committee would like the NYSGISA to provide that training in the form of an annual webinar. Much as the NYS Office for CSCIC used to provide half-day sessions that traveled about NYS training users in various facets of GIS, the NYSGISA Education Committee sees an opportunity to provide a similar service without the travel costs. The Education Committee also sees short and long term opportunities for more NYSGISA engagement in the classroom at all levels, on GIS Day, through continuing education, and the general proliferation of GIS in the mainstream.

## Introduction & Background

Given the current economic constraints that most members and prospective members of NYSGISA are facing, the Education Committee seeks to shift its focus for the coming year. While the establishment of a temporary task force to define the potential for SUNY (the State University of New York) to become the GIS education and training center of the U.S. may continue to be a long term goal (see below), in the short term, the Committee's focus must be on providing cost-effective GIS training for its membership and fostering GIS knowledge in NYS beyond the Association's membership.

The Education Committee's goal for 2007 – 2008 was "to create an organizational capacity within NYSGISA that can introduce emerging geospatial information technologies and current best practices in various academic, research and application domains." According to its objectives for 2007 – 2008, the Education Committee sought to define activities intended to contribute to an increase in understanding of geospatial information technology and their applications. An annual work program detailing specific activities and intended measurable outcomes has been desired since the Committee's inception. The Committee also stated support for the continuance of the Galileo Awards and the NYS GIS Coordination Program Education Work Group.

More recently, the Education Committee, under the leadership of Bob Brower, wrote to SUNY Chancellor Nancy L. Zimpher on 3 September 2009 to pursue "the application of [geospatial] information technology and the potential preeminence of SUNY on the national geospatial training stage." To that end, he envisioned a GIT Task Force, as mentioned above, with membership from a variety of SUNY institutions and NYS agencies. Indeed, he has already solicited the support of a number of prominent individuals from these institutions and agencies.
